

For almost 80 years, we've been saving the lives of lost, abandoned and neglected animals while delivering programs that bring people and pets together.

Each year, we reunite, rehabilitate and rehome over a thousand pets across Sydney. Before they find their forever homes, our vet team and animal care specialists provide urgent medical treatment, behavioural support, and most importantly, safety and love. We never place a time limit on any treatable animal in our care.

Sydney Dogs & Cats Home is a proud member of Companion Animal Network Australia, a collective of six agencies working to make the world better for pets. Together, we promote responsible pet ownership, celebrate the humananimal bond, and advocate for high welfare standards in line with the NSW Companion Animals Act 1998.

Now, with the community's support through our Make Home Happen Appeal, we're building a new purpose-built shelter in Kurnell – a permanent home that will allow us to care for more animals, offer greater community services, and ensure every pet who comes to us has the chance to heal and belong.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Joanne Bermingham
President of Sydney Dogs & Cats Home

In the final months of 2025 and as we edge closer to relocating into our new Home in Kurnell, we are on the precipice of a new era for Sydney Dogs & Cats Home. We look forward to opening the doors of our new shelter later this year!

The SDCH team has worked tirelessly throughout the year and demonstrated exceptional dedication by successfully managing operations at our two temporary locations, whilst also leading fundraising initiatives for our new shelter.

In the role of President, I am committed to ensuring a strategic approach for Sydney Dogs & Cats Home as we navigate ongoing changes, and sector-specific challenges to ensure our financial sustainability. I also remain committed to actively volunteering in the dog kennels, and value the opportunity to work alongside our volunteers and dedicated staff members to deliver expert care, love and hope to animals in need.

As you will see in the Treasurer's Report, we had a strong finish to the financial year. Our operating budget closed with a profit of just under \$300,000 due to Council income, bequests and donations all greater than forecasted. We achieved the most successful end of FY Tax Appeal in the Home's history. Our goal in the year ahead, with the increased size and capacity available to us in our new shelter, is to increase our partnerships with more local Councils across the Sydney region to deliver essential care for Sydney's lost, abandoned and neglected animals. We also expect to support an increase in animal surrenders to the Home due to community challenges including cost of living pressures.

Our challenge in the coming financial year as we seek to manage operating expenses at the two temporary sites, whilst fundraising for our new shelter.

The new Sydney Dogs & Cats Home is a \$21.6 million build made possible through the incredible generosity of our community. The NSW Government provided \$12 million in cornerstone funding, and thanks to the kindness of our supporters, philanthropists, and partners, we've now raised over \$15.7 million in total.

We are continuing our efforts to raise the remaining funds needed to complete the build – which includes additional kennels and catteries, and the relocation of our veterinary clinic from a leased site to our new purpose-built Home in Kurnell.

I would like to express my gratitude for the work of all our staff, volunteers, foster carers and everyone who has supported and donated to our Home. An enormous thank you to Melissa Penn and her team. I am immensely proud to work with such passionate and dedicated team members.

I also want to thank our entire Board, who continue to work diligently with the leadership team to address challenges and chart a sustainable path forward.

The 2025 Annual Report is a snapshot of how together we've made a difference to the vulnerable animals in our care. Thank you for being an integral part of the SDCH journey.

MANAGING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

As we close out the 2024–25 financial year, I reflect with deep gratitude and immense pride on the journey Sydney Dogs & Cats Home has taken. It has been another defining year, challenging, inspiring, and transformative, anchored by the support of our incredible people and the monumental progress toward our new permanent home in Kurnell.

Building Our Future: The Kurnell Facility

The past year has been a turning point in our 80+ year history, with construction finally underway on our long-awaited Kurnell facility. Following last year's gamechanging \$12 million investment commitment from the NSW Government, this year has focused heavily on delivering the early phases of our build.

To date, we've:

- Finalised tender processes and appointed a construction partner
- · Completed essential groundwork and slab pours
- Erected permanent kennel buildings and our maintenance shed
- Installed critical demountable buildings for veterinary care, offices, and cat housing
- Progressed with fencing, services installation, and early landscaping works

We are now targeting a late December move-in, with internal fit-outs and compliance phases commencing soon. Our teams are also deep into transition planning to ensure a seamless experience for both animals and people as we move to our new facility.

Financial Sustainability and Innovation

In parallel with our capital works, we've remained focused on operating sustainably during a time of enormous transition. Running dual sites while building our new facility and preparing to centralise operations at Kurnell has placed strain on resources, but has also driven innovation.

Key highlights from FY25:

- Continued growth in fundraising revenue, particularly from bequests
- Strong operational results and surplus generation, despite rising costs
- Expansion of veterinary services, providing accessible care to the community while generating critical income
- Council partnerships caring for 8 Council areas this year supporting their people and their pets.
- Prudent cost control, particularly in administration and finance functions

Many Councils have also engaged with us on preventative outreach programs, which we will grow once operational at Kurnell.

The year ahead will be one of transformation. With our facility expected to open in **late December**, we are focused on:


- Finalising Stage 1 construction and fit-out

BUILDING OUR HOME OF HOPE IN KURNELL

Our dream of a permanent Sydney Dogs & Cats Home is becoming reality. What was once a vacant site in Kurnell is growing into a place filled with purpose, with new kennel blocks, cat housing, and community spaces now taking shape.

Each milestone, mentioned in the Managing Director's report, brings us closer to a purpose-built facility that will double our capacity to care for Sydney's lost, abandoned, and neglected pets, and provide a safe, healing environment designed around their needs. The new Home will also create dedicated spaces for community programs that connect people and animals in meaningful ways.

Sour Cream

The Make Home Happen Appeal, launched in August 2024, has continued to gather momentum, inspiring extraordinary generosity from individuals, philanthropists, and partners who share our belief that every animal deserves safety, care, and love.

Alongside the NSW Government's \$12 million cornerstone commitment, we are deeply grateful to major supporters including Basil Sellers AM and the Gavin Simpson Education Endowment, whose belief in our mission has helped bring this dream to life. Together with community donations, we have now raised over \$15.7 million of our \$21.6 million goal – an incredible achievement that reflects the compassion and commitment of our supporters.

As we move toward completion in late 2025, every donation, partnership, and campaign, from Hope Blooms to our digital appeals and partnership engagement, has helped bring this vision closer to life. While our veterinary team will remain at Strathfield for now, our long-term goal as we raise more funds, is to bring every part of Sydney Dogs & Cats Home together under one roof.

Together, we are not just building a shelter, but creating a lasting Home built on compassion, hope, and second chances.

VET AND ANIMAL CARE TEAM REPORT

Dr Laura Taylor Head of Animal Care

The past year has been another inspiring chapter for the Sydney Dogs & Cats Home team, as our veterinary, shelter, and foster departments have worked tirelessly to ensure the very best outcomes for the animals in our care and for those in the wider community. Despite the ongoing challenges of high intake numbers, complex medical cases, and a record-breaking kitten season, the dedication of our staff, volunteers, and foster carers has remained unwavering. Together, we continue to embody our mission: to responsibly reunite, rehabilitate, and rehome every treatable animal that comes through our doors.

Veterinary Services

Our veterinary team has continued to deliver exceptional medical care for shelter animals while also expanding our outreach to the community. Over the past year, we provided over 3,300 consultations and 970 surgeries for shelter animals. In addition, we continued to support the community and generate income for the Home by offering private veterinary services which saw us complete 558 consultations and 110 surgeries.

Partnerships with local councils continue to be a major focus of our outreach efforts. We were proud to complete subsidised desexing programs with Randwick, Fairfield, Campbelltown, and Georges River Councils, as well as through the National Desexing Network, RSPCA and Cat Protection Society, ensuring vital services reached pet owners in need. In total, hundreds of animals across Sydney benefitted from these programs, helping to prevent unwanted litters and promote responsible pet ownership.

We also continued to provide care for non-profit rescue organisations, including Dogs, Cats and Horses (DCH) and the Cat Protection Society's DIVA (Desexing, Identification, Vaccination Assistance) program. These partnerships highlight our commitment to supporting the broader rescue community and ensuring that even more animals can access high-quality veterinary care.

Foster Care

The foster program has once again proven to be a lifeline for some of our most vulnerable animals. This year, we facilitated over 1,300 foster placements, including 404 cat placements, 712 kitten placements, 227 dog placements, and 37 rabbit placements – each providing a safe and nurturing environment for animals to rest, recover, and prepare for adoption.

With ongoing challenges such as neonatal kittens, large breed dogs, and animals with ringworm or behavioural needs, our foster carers stepped up time and again. Through strong collaboration with our marketing team, we averaged 100 foster sign-ups per month, ensuring a robust network of carers ready to respond to callouts.

The impact of this program cannot be overstated: every foster placement not only improves the welfare of that individual animal but also eases the pressure on our shelter facilities, allowing us to extend our reach and

Shelter Care

Our shelter team remains at the heart of our operations, caring for thousands of animals who arrive lost, abandoned, or surrendered. Our shelter staff continued to provide the highest standards of daily care—feeding, cleaning, enrichment, and behavioural support—ensuring every animal feels safe and supported during their stay.

This year, our shelter operations have focused heavily on streamlining processes to reduce stress and improve outcomes for animals. Strong collaboration between our shelter, vet, and foster teams has allowed us to create faster pathways into care and onto adoption, ensuring that animals spend less time in shelter and more time on their way to loving homes.

The combined achievements of our veterinary, foster, and shelter teams this year are a testament to the dedication, compassion, and professionalism of everyone involved in the care of our animals. From lifesaving surgeries to the round-the-clock efforts of foster carers, and from the daily dedication of our shelter staff to the expanded reach of our community desexing programs, together we are building a stronger, more compassionate future for Sydney's pets.

As we look forward to the opening of our new Kurnell facility, we are excited about the opportunities to expand our services, strengthen our community programs, and continue to provide the very best standard of care for every animal who comes through our doors.

FOSTERING HOPE – TRIXIE'S STORY

When eight-year-old Akita Trixie arrived at Sydney Dogs & Cats Home, she was in heartbreaking condition. Her fur was matted, her ears raw from fly bites, and her paw swollen from infection. She was in constant pain – suffering from kidney disease, a urinary infection, and a fractured molar.

The veterinary team immediately began her treatment, easing her discomfort and helping her take the first steps toward recovery. But while her physical wounds began to heal, Trixie's emotional scars needed more time – and that's where her foster carer, April, came in.

"The shelter team had worked wonders by the time Trixie came to me," April recalls. "They briefed me carefully on her special care needs, her kidney-friendly diet, the gentle approach she needed, and how to help her rebuild trust."

In April's quiet, patient care, Trixie began to rediscover what it meant to feel safe. Each milestone marked a small but profound victory – the first time she wagged her tail at the sound of April's voice, the morning she stepped forward for a pat instead of hiding, the day she picked up a toy to play.

"And then," says April, "she barked with excitement when I came home – a sound I wasn't sure I'd ever hear."

Thanks to this care and compassion, Trixie has now found her forever home – healthy, happy and surrounded by love.

Foster carers like April are an essential part of Sydney Dogs & Cats Home's extended family - providing love, stability, and space for recovery that simply can't be replicated in a shelter environment.

Each foster home is a bridge between rescue and rehoming, giving animals the confidence they need to heal and thrive.

Seeing the World Anew

Minty arrived to the shelter as a 4 week old kitten - she had been found as a stray on the street and required urgent vet care. She was unable to eat without assistance, was covered in fleas and dehydrated, but the most pressing issue was her eyes - the lids were swollen and both eyes were sealed shut with pus. Veterinary examination revealed she had granulation tissues on her eyes that resulted in limited vision. Minty received extensive treatment including eye ointments, antibiotics and consultations with eye specialists - though she will never have full vision, she learned to navigate by seeing shadows and memorising the layout of her home. Foster was an imperative part of Minty's healing journey - her carer was able to provide her with all the medication, time and care she needed to recover and thrive. Minty is now a 10 month old kitty enjoying life in her forever home.

HAPPY TAILS POND

The Power of Care and Second Chances

Pond was found as a one-year-old stray cat and transferred to SDCH. On entry he was immediately friendly and soaking up all the attention, happy to be somewhere safe and warm with plenty of food, though the vets had some medical concerns - they found a large ulcer on his tongue along with moderate dental disease, and he was found to be FIV positive. Pond was placed into foster to settle and his carer was instrumental in his healing journey – she brought him in for multiple vet appointments to check on the progress of his ulcer, administered a daily medication over many months, and supported his healing after a full mouth extraction. It took multiple months of frequent vet visits before Pond's ulcer was fully healed, and his carer then continued to look after him for a total of 9 months before he found his forever home.





A Tale of Labour and Love

Late on a Saturday afternoon, our shelter received an unexpected arrival — a heavily pregnant Cavoodle named Barbara. She appeared to be in the early stages of labour, and was visibly stressed, unsure of her surroundings, and seeking comfort. It quickly became evident that she would not cope well in a kennel environment and needed immediate care.

Barbara quickly formed a strong bond with one of our staff members, who recognised her distress and took her home to provide a safe and calm environment for her to nest. Over the course of an exhausting 40-hour labour, Barbara gave birth to seven healthy puppies. Despite appearing to be a first-time mother, Barbara displayed remarkable maternal instincts, nursing and caring for each puppy attentively from the moment they arrived.

With her newborns thriving, Barbara moved to a foster home where she could focus on raising her puppies in a quiet and supportive environment. Caring for a litter of seven was no small task, and the journey came with its challenges — including one puppy who required critical care and bottle-feeding in the early days. Thanks to the dedication of our foster carers and veterinary team, all seven puppies began to grow and develop into happy, playful young dogs.

Just as the litter became old enough for their first vaccinations, it was discovered that they had contracted ringworm, a common but contagious fungal infection. Treatment began immediately, involving careful management, medication, and frequent cleaning to ensure their continued wellbeing.

Now, several weeks later, Barbara's puppies are thriving. They remain under treatment for ringworm but are happy, active, and well-socialised — ready to take the next step toward finding their forever homes.



Barbara, having completed her role as a devoted mother, is now enjoying a well-earned rest in a loving foster home of her own. No longer caring for her litter around the clock, she is rediscovering the joys of simply being a dog — exploring her surroundings, enjoying daily walks, and receiving the attention and affection she deserves in a safe and stable environment.

Barbara's story is a testament to the power of timely intervention, compassionate care, and the strength of our foster network.

NALA'S JOURNEY

Fighting for Her Life

When Nala was carried through our doors, she was fighting for her life.

At just eleven months old, the young Staffy had suffered devastating injuries – a fractured jaw, missing teeth and a torn ear that had to be removed. She was frightened, bleeding and barely conscious.

Our veterinary team worked quickly to stabilise her, cleaning and dressing her wounds, managing infection and pain, and sitting by her side as she began to recover.

Once strong enough, Nala went into foster care, where her carers were invaluable in helping her heal physically and emotionally. With their love and patience, her confidence returned – and her tail began to wag again.

BROADER IMPACT

Fostering Hope

More than 1,300 animals found safety and comfort in foster homes this year. Our foster carers are a lifeline for animals needing extra time or space to recover, such as neonatal kittens, large-breed dogs, or those with complex needs.

With around 100 new foster sign-ups per month, the program not only transforms individual lives but also eases pressure on our shelter, creating room to help even more animals in need.

Healing and Prevention

Our veterinary team delivered over 3,300 consultations and 970 surgeries for shelter animals this year, while expanding outreach through 558 private consultations and 110 surgeries for the wider community.


Through partnerships with Councils and organisations like the National Desexing Network, RSPCA and Cat Protection Society, we provided hundreds of subsidised desexing procedures, helping reduce surrenders and prevent unwanted litters before they happen.

Connection and Companionship

Through our Aged Care Program, we bring the joy and calm of animal companionship to people who can no longer have pets of their own. These visits brighten days, ease loneliness and remind residents that love and connection have no age limits.

We also had the joy of hosting **Ella**, a young cat lover whose *Starlight Wish* was to spend a weekend surrounded by cats. After a weekend of 'cat-ivities', Ella and her family ended their adventure with a VIP visit to Sydney Dogs & Cats Home. She met the cats waiting for their forever homes, learned how they come into our care, and even became a 'vet nurse' for the day – listening to heartbeats, brushing fur, and cuddling tiny kittens.

As we wrap up our final full year at the temporary Austral site, our incredible volunteers continue to surprise and inspire with their passion and enthusiasm — even in challenging conditions. With the final push toward Kurnell on the horizon, there's a growing sense of excitement in the air and a shared curiosity about what lies ahead.

Over the past twelve months we have continued to see the growth of our volunteer network and the impact on community. A total of 106 volunteers contributed more than 7,299 hours to the ongoing care of our animals, support of our team and widening the engagement and education of the wider communities.

Our event volunteers were out in force, rain, hail or shine across the city from the western suburbs to the heart of our new home in The Shire. They connected with people at various locations including; Doggy Fashion shows, appearing on Sunrise, market stalls, Bunnings pop ups, The Annual Dog & Cat Lovers Festival and our Sydney Dogs and Cats Home inaugural Christmas Market to which they certainly brought much jolly and cheer.

FUNDRAISING AND MARKETING REPORT

In 2024/25, our fundraising and marketing efforts reached new heights – and it's all thanks to you. Despite a tough economic climate, your generosity has carried us through another challenging year. Together, we've not only kept our doors open for over a thousand lost and abandoned animals in temporary care, but also made extraordinary progress towards building their permanent new home in Kurnell.

Our strategy has been simple: make every gift count, grow opportunities to support, and strengthen relationships. From always-on digital campaigns to new community initiatives, we've created more ways for people to give when and how they want. The results speak for themselves:

- Business-as-usual fundraising: My small team
 was responsible for raising \$1.81 million against a
 budget of \$1.26 million that's 43% above target,
 driven by appeals, partnerships, grants, community
 fundraising and events, bequests and merchandise
 through our online shop. Both our Christmas and Tax
 Appeals broke records, with the EOFY appeal alone
 raising \$346,480 at a 5:1 return on investment.
- Capital campaign: Our Make Home Happen Appeal in August 2024 has raised more than \$15.7 million of our \$21.6 million goal 72% of the way home. Major gifts of \$1 million from philanthropist Basil Sellers AM and \$500,000 from Gavin Simpson Education Endowment have been joined by thousands of smaller but equally meaningful contributions. Our return on investment across the capital appeal sits at 238%, which is a good result for a new three-year campaign. You can read more about that in Building Our Home of Hope in Kurnell.
- Community growth: Over 1,900 new donors joined our family this year, across business-as-usual and capital appeals.
- Engagement: Media coverage on Sunrise, in the
 Daily and Sunday Telegraph and across social
 platforms, plus support from ambassadors and
 influencers, have helped amplify our message.
 Events like the Dog & Cat Lovers Show and
 Howloween at the Beresford brought more people
 into our community, while workplace and corporate
 partners continued to back our mission.

 Awareness campaigns: Initiatives such as Softy Staffy, adoption drives and desexing programs challenged misconceptions and provided valuable information to the community, and most importantly, helped more animals find their forever homes.

These results prove that fundraising is more than numbers – it's a community of people standing strong for abandoned and lost pets, even in a cost-of-living crisis.

As we look ahead, the challenge remains: raising the final \$5.9 million to complete our new Home while continuing to fund the daily care of animals who arrive at our doors. We will be launching new campaigns, new ways to engage with us and new events.

If this year has shown us anything, it's that together we can achieve the extraordinary.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Whilst the past 12 months has been a trying time for most if not all of us, for Sydney Dogs & Cats Home (SDCH) it has been a huge year of growth fuelled by these challenges, as well as the anticipated new chapter at our Kurnell facility.

As we count down to the official opening of Kurnell, this project has created many challenges, many difficult decisions and conversations, but ultimately led to huge growth in the depth and breadth of the board's roles, responsibilities and mindset, as we navigate previously uncharted waters. However, a more passionate, all female, board you will never see!

Final results for FY2025 are slightly down on last year, with revenue coming in at \$4,217,140, a decrease of \$270,834 on FY2024. However, this can be largely explained by a reduction in bequests of \$185,899 in FY2025 compared to FY2024, something that is not predictable or budgeted. Not surprisingly, our net profit/ surplus for the year is also down in FY2025 at \$291,203, compared to \$477,457 FY2024. However, this difference is almost exactly the deficit we saw from the reduction in bequests revenue. Maintaining revenue levels whilst reducing costs throughout FY2025 is highly commendable and shows the organisation is under consistent and solid management.

Whilst 2026 will not be an easier year for SDCH, with consumer spending and economic pressures still relevant and widespread, it is clear that the board are committed to putting 110% into everything they do for the organisation. When one door closes, another door always opens and Managing Director Melissa Penn is doing a fantastic job in finding all and every opportunity she can for the organisation to keep us on track, on budget and on schedule! (with respect to the construction of Kurnell)

As the transition to Kurnell begins towards the end of 2025, SDCH will be operating from two locations as efficiently and seamlessly as possible, as we await the funding required to build the new vet clinic at Kurnell. Whilst the option to close down the SDCH vet clinic at Strathfield is an option, the care and welfare of all the animals that pass through the SDCH doors is nonnegotiable. Therefore, whilst many scenarios have been considered, the ideal decision is to retain our own vet clinic, even if that is at a separate location.

The summary of the BAU / Operating result is as follows:

Maintaining consistency throughout the profit and loss results has also translated to the balance sheet, with cash reserves closing at \$1,497,891 at 30 June 2025, down from \$1,716,397 as at 30 June 2024, which can be explained by the transfer of some term deposit funds to the capital campaign. The net asset position has actually increased to \$3,024,287 as at 30 June 2025, compared to \$2,615,311 as at 30 June 2024, meaning our assets have outgrown our liabilities compared to the previous year.

They say it takes a village, and to you our village, we say thank you! Thank you for all of your support over the past 12 months, to the incredible staff and board members who show up each and every week or month to ensure this organisation continues to be one of, if not, the best in our state.





FINANCIAL REPORT - CORE OPERATIONS



Melissa Penn Managing Director

Sydney Dogs & Cats Home (SDCH) delivered a solid and stable financial performance in FY2025, with a total revenue of \$4,217,140 and a surplus after tax of \$291,203 for core operations. This result reflects the organisation's prudent financial management, effective cost control, and continued donor and community support, despite a reduction in grant income and ongoing operational pressures.

Income

Total Revenue: \$4,217,140, a decrease of 6% from the previous year (2024: \$4,487,974).

Major Income Sources:

- Operational Revenue: \$2,493,994 (2024: \$2,163,862) represented 59% of total income (2024: 48%), which includes adoption fees, council fees, and grants.
 - Adoption Fees: \$252,962 (2024: \$199,382), increased by 27%
 - Council Fees: \$1,774,039 (2024: \$1,628,759), increased by 9%
 - Grants: \$67,850 (2024: \$335,721), decrease of 80% reflecting reduced government support and unsuccessful grant applications from the previous year.
- Fundraising Revenue: \$1,716,963, 16% down from previous year (2024: \$2,052,405) (41% of total income), driven by bequests, donations, and events.
 - Bequests: \$622,115 (2024: \$808,014), down 23%.
 - Donations: \$1,094,848.32 (2024: \$1,195,976), down 8%.
 - Sales of Goods & Services: \$13,590
 (2024: \$22,163), primarily from merchandise and product sales 39% reduction from previous year.

We are now targeting a November 2025 move-in, with internal fit-outs and compliance phases commencing soon. Our teams are also deep into transition planning to ensure a seamless experience for both animals and people as we move to our new facility.

Expenditure

Total Expenses: \$3,925,937, 2% decrease from the previous year (2024: \$4,010,517).

The overall reduction in total expenses highlights effective management of operating costs amid inflationary pressures and transition demands.

Major Expenditure Areas:

- Employment Expenses: \$2,726,294.02 (2024: \$2,682,880) (69% of total expenses), 2% increase due to increases with Award, CPI and Superannuation entitlements.
- Fundraising Expenses: \$314,801 (2024: \$335,498) (8% of total expenses and 6% down from previous year).
- Occupancy & Relocation Expenses: \$309,801
 (2024: \$413,150) (8% of total expenses and 25%
 reduction from previous year), reflecting reduced
 temporary site-related costs as Kurnell preparations
 advance.
- Cost of Goods Sold: \$365,735 (2024: \$384,449)
 (9% of total expenses and down 9% from previous year).
- Administration Expenses: \$209,265 (2024: \$173,400) (5% of total expenses and an increase of 21% due to system and facility maintenance and upgrades).

Surplus and Financial Position

Net Surplus: The surplus after tax amounted to \$291,203, a 39% decrease from the previous year's surplus of \$477,457.

Total Assets: As of 30 June 2025, SDCH reported total assets of \$3,486,868 (2024: \$3,353,914), up 4%.

Net Assets: The net assets stood at \$3,018,104 (2024: \$2,615,311), up by 15% reflecting SDCH's strong balance sheet and capacity to meet its obligations.




Future Outlook

FY2026 will be a pivotal year as SDCH prepares to transition to the new purpose-built Kurnell facility.


Key considerations include:

- Managing **dual-site overheads** and relocation costs through the December 2025 move.
- Sustaining **operational liquidity** alongside major **capital investment** in the facility build.
- Continuing to drive fundraising growth to support both operational needs and the capital campaign to complete the facility construction.
- Leveraging the new facility to increase service capacity, improve efficiency, and expand community programs once operational.

With careful financial stewardship and strong community partnerships, SDCH remains well-positioned for long-term sustainability and growth.

FINANCIAL REPORT - CAPITAL

Melissa Penn Managing Director

Our Capital Campaign delivered a strong financial position for the 2025 financial year, reflecting substantial fundraising success and the first year of significant capital investment for the new Kurnell Shelter project. The results reflect strong community support and early philanthropic engagement, positioning the campaign for ongoing momentum into FY2026.

Income

Total Income: \$1,990,626.

Major Income Sources:

• Trusts & Foundations: \$522,500

Individual and corporate Donations: \$1,458,628

• Events & Sponsorship: \$9,499



Expenditure

Total Operating Expenses: \$601,866.

Key Expenditure Categories:

- Employment Costs: \$108,031 (18%)
- Fundraising & Marketing: \$401,097 (67%) upfront investment required for a three-year-campaign
- Relocation & Project Costs: \$81,051 (13%)
- Administration & Office Costs: \$11,687 (< 2%)

Capitalised construction and legal expenses totalling \$1,138,469 are reflected in the balance sheet as assets, representing direct investment into the Kurnell Shelter.

Surplus and Financial Position

Net Surplus (after expenses): \$1,388,761.

Cash and cash equivalents at year end were \$473,997, up from \$1,985 in FY2024, ensuring liquidity for ongoing construction expenses and fundraising activities.

Outlook and Forward Priorities

The Capital Campaign will continue into FY2026 with a focus on:

- Securing the remaining \$6 million in capital funding required to complete the Kurnell Shelter construction
- Expanding major gift and corporate partnership pipelines, leveraging the momentum of FY2025 success.
- Managing cash flow as construction progresses to ensure alignment between pledges, receipts, and expenditure timing.

The financial results confirm that SDCH is in a sound position to continue delivering the Capital Campaign objectives and complete the new Kurnell facility.


